2023 DEPOT RECYCLING BY THE NUMBERS

Materials We Collect	2023 Weights
Ferrous metal	23 tons
Glass	12 tons
Fiber (paper & cardboard)	146 tons
Plastic film & Styrofoam	8 tons
Co-mingled recycling (metal, plastic)	35 tons
Tires	36 tons
Batteries and scrap	6 tons
Light bulbs	4 tons
Electronics	45 tons
Household hazardous materials	10 tons

In 2023, 4,170 residents dropped off their household hazardous waste at the Depot. *Thank you, Marshall County!*

Where Do Our Recyclables Go?

Marshall County recyclables are collected and processed in the United States. Most of the materials we collect at the Depot are recycled and sold as feedstocks to manufacturers in Indiana, becoming new paper, cardboard, aluminum cans, tires, plastic bags, glass bottles, and steel products. The Styrofoam we collect becomes new insulation in Canada.

Hazardous materials such as light bulbs, batteries, and electronics are also recyclable, yielding valuable elements such as lithium, mercury, cadmium, gold, silver, and nickel.

Why recycle? Recycling conserves natural resources and reduces the air pollution and carbon emissions created when we recover virgin materials from the ground. It also creates jobs for other Hoosiers--10 recycling jobs for every 1 job in waste management.
